District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Liberty MS serves 907 students enrolled in grades sixth through eighth. The student population's ethnicity is made of 75% Hispanic and 25% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 79% White, 15% Black, 0% Native, 2% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 2% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Johndrell Jones and Assistant Principals Latoya Thinn and Bethany Chappetta. Liberty MS is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These includeCambridge Magnet Program, National Junior Honor's Society, Band, Orchestra, Chorus, Drama Club, Business Education, Battle of the Books Club, and Chess Club.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Liberty MS indicates that the average age of the collection is 2009 and the number of books per student is 12. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Liberty MS does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Students in this school improved significantly on the state achievement tests, particularly in Math.
- In addition to the physical media center collection, the district provides almost 5,000 eBooks, audiobooks and digital magazines.
- The majority of our collection falls within the 675-909 Lexile range however, more titles are needed at the lower 350-499 Lexile level to match the age/reading level of our students.
- The average publication date of 2009 is acceptable but needs to be improved in certain areas such as: Religion and Science
- This media center needs more book featuring LatinX characters and/or non-fiction texts with Hispanic role models
- Purchases of new books will focus on Hispanic students and Hispanic Heritage

• Weeding will focus on the OcPS Catalog Project expectations as well as aged titles in fiction and/or nonfiction.

Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

(adapted from https://www.fldoe.org/accountability/assessments/k-12-student-assessment/results/2023.stml) In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data.

Collection Analysis

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.
